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Homekey+ Overview





Permanent Supportive Housing for Veterans

\$1.065 billion worth of housing investments for veterans who are at risk of homelessness, experiencing homelessness, or experiencing chronic homelessness who have mental health needs or a substance use disorder.

Modeled after HCD's existing Homekey Program grants for housing with supportive services:

- Extremely low income (30% AMI or less).
- Experiencing or at-risk of homelessness + behavioral health challenge
- At least 5 years supportive services required; initial seed money for operations but looking for long term sustainability
- Coordination with County Behavioral Health department. Large counties (population over 100k) required to have veteran on Behavioral Health planning board.

Eligible Use of Funds:

 Acquisition, rehabilitation of motels, hotels, hostels, or other sites and assets that could be converted to permanent housing.

Eligible Entities:

- Cities, Counties, regional and local public entities
- Development Sponsor (loans only)

Awards will be announced on a rolling basis as applications are received and reviewed.





Veterans Support to Self-Reliance Pilot Overview



Purpose

The mission of the VSSR Pilot is to evaluate enhanced supportive services models in PSH to:

- Improve outcomes for aging and high acuity veterans
- Decrease housing displacement
- Allow veterans to age in place in a community of care



Grant Overview

Pilot Grants are intended to support Pilot Grantees throughout a three-year observational and reporting period.

- \$20 million total / \$4.5 million max grant amount
- Pilot Grant qualifications include currently providing supportive services in veteran PSH
- Staffing at individual sites are tailored to fit within the overall organizational structure of the Pilot site.
- Flexibility in program design to fit the specific needs of each grantee.
- Pilot Grantee staff and leadership duties include significant engagement with CalVet and Consultants technical assistance, reporting, and evaluation procedures.
- Participation in local Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)





VSSR Grant Model Characteristics

Funded positions:

- Service Assistant, Peer Specialist, Mental Health Specialist, Transportation Specialist, Occupational Therapist, Social Worker (Geriatric), Nurse, VSSR Pilot Specialist
- Flexibility in direct hire/contracting for staff positions.

Locations:

- Current operating PSH sites with existing services staff
- Established service coordination, case management, property management

VSSR Reporting and Impact

Reporting:

- Quarterly reporting, weekly office hours, regular roundtables
- VSSR Data Collection Manual
- Report to Legislature: February 2025

Impact:

- Interim reports: December 2024, July 2025, January 2026
- Final report/presentation of findings: August/September 2026





Preliminary Findings: Data from the first year of the Pilot shows significant improvements from baseline to the fourth quarter in several key areas.

- **Health Behaviors:** Missed medical appointments declined by 81%, use of specialty care increased by 29%, medication adherence increased by 17%, and alcohol use dropped by 65%.
- Acute Care Utilization: Emergency visits and ambulance calls decreased by more than 50%.
- **Social Engagement:** Participation in group activities more than doubled, and veterans were leaving their units more frequently.
- Food Security: The percentage of veterans eating three meals a day nearly doubled.



California Veterans Health Initiative – Mental Health Support (CVHI-MHS) Grant Program Overview



CVHI-Mental Health Support Grant Program

- \$38 million for competitive grants
- The goal of the CVHI-MHS grant program is to expand access to mental healthcare for veterans and their families, especially those who are historically underserved, by supporting a sustainable network of veteran-specific resources throughout the state of California with three-year grants.
- Comprehensive, coordinated statewide approach to minimizing the incidence of veteran suicide by focusing on prevention, early intervention, and treatment services.





Scope, Expectations, Deliverables & Goals

- Scope: Outreach, Peer Support, Case Management, Outpatient Clinical Care, Nontraditional & Innovative Approaches
- Expectations:
 - Improve the wellbeing of CA veterans and their families experiencing barriers to mental healthcare
 - CVHI grantees collectively to providing a total of 42,000 clinical appointments annually.
- Deliverables: Monthly Data Reporting, Grant Reports
